Janet J B Taylor - Eulogy 5 December 1939 - 26 September 2023

Janet always said, "I've had a wonderful life."

Her life began in Loch Gelly, Fife, born to her parents William and Mary, with her older brother, Sandy.

During the war the family lived in Glasgow, and Janet's first memory was of an air raid, remembering her mum wrapping her in a little kilt before going down to the air raid shelter.

The family moved back to Loch Gelly and after the war came to Castleford when William got a job there. Janet was 5 and Sandy was 7. They lived at 1 Ryebread near the river Aire. Janet went to school in Castleford moving to the grammar school to study for her A levels. After only one year she was accepted at Thornbridge Hall, a teacher training college near Bakewell in Derbyshire. Janet's first teaching job was at the Vale School, Knottingley then moved to Redhill, Airedale. After this Janet was appointed headteacher of Throstle Farm School, Knottingley and then Tithe Barn First School, which was later to become the infants at St Botolph's Church of England Primary School.

Janet spent 26 years as a headteacher, also as a superhead, her skills and experience helping failing schools to succeed. Janet loved her time teaching, whatever sort of day she had, the children lifted her.

Janet met Richard at school, they were married at Holy Cross, Airedale and on their 4th wedding anniversary Amanda was born. They were later to divorce and after that Janet lived life to the full, a life that was truly inspirational.

Janet embraced her career, travelling around the world, with



friends, Pontefract Astronomical Society, the Masons (she was a member over 50 years). She was a volunteer at the family planning clinic and so much more. She was intelligent, knowledgeable about so many things and she loved reading. The books she read as a child, with her name and address inside, she passed on to Amanda. Janet was very proud of her work as a Bereavement Counsellor for Cruse.

Janet was a well loved member of the church family at St Botolph's and did every job you could think of. Latterly she was our safeguarding officer and, as with everything Janet did, she did a wonderful job. She soon had all the training completed and paperwork sorted.

It can be said that Janet was a perfectionist in every aspect of her life. Immaculately dressed, her hair always perfect and, I am told, she often cleaned before the cleaner came. She was always busy, when she came home from work she would be marking, making maths card, mounting pictures - she was a powerhouse of energy.

Janet loved life - enjoyed roller coasters and other excitements like 'pinching peas from the fields'. She became known as 'a game bird' and this led to her being called Auntie Bird by Martha. Janet was a generous person, with her time not just her money. She was always great company and fun. She was always over the top; for example if she was making tags for Christmas presents they would be the most fantastic tags you had ever seen with angels on them and all sorts of other things. You could never have a birthday without the cake slice that sang 'Happy Birthday', she would even play it over the phone. Janet always said you had to have a balloon on your birthday so now many family and friends have a collection of balloon weights around their homes. Janet was mum to Amanda, granny to Adam and Poppy, amazing auntie to Ellen and Andrew and a huge support to Andrew's wife,

Lisa. Janet was 'auntie Janet' to lots

of people.

She was always there, she was the person you went to confide in and you could always rely on Janet to make you laugh, however bad the situation. Losing Janet, who was so full of life, is difficult to come to terms with for her family and friends, and everyone with whom she came into contact. Janet made a positive difference wherever she went and she will be sorely missed.

Finding Joseph

The nativity set with its little figures shows what Christmas is all about. In the centre baby Jesus, Mary in her ethereal blue dress, the shepherds with their sheep and the majestic kings with their crowns and fine robes with the angel watching over everyone. But what about the figure in the plain brown robe often mistaken for a shepherd? It is of course Joseph who can often be overlooked, lost or forgotten in this story.

Joseph is not lost in the Bible. Matthew tells the story of Jesus' birth from Joseph's perspective. Joseph was a man of faith who submitted to God's will just as Mary was a woman of faith who did the same. So let's not forget Joseph this Christmas.

So who was Joseph?

The first thing the Bible tells us about Joseph is that he ws engaged to Mary. She was promised to him. The engagement promise was as binding as a marriage vow. So when she was found to be with child it must have been devastating. It seemed obvious to Joseph that Mary had cheated on him and they had not been formally married.

The second thing the Bible tells us about Joseph is that he was a righteous man. He believed in and truly worshipped God. His faith was in the Almighty and that meant that he tried to follow God's laws, God's laws were clear that adulterers should be stoned. Mary had seemingly committed adultery.

This is where the third thing the Bible tells us comes into play. It says, "Joseph, being a righteous man and unwilling to expose her to public disgrace, planned to dismiss her quietly." So was he being righteous when he wasn't obeying God's law?

The Good News Translation says, "Joseph was a man who always did what was right, but he did not want to disgrace Mary publicly." Joseph out aside his own feelings of hurt to take care of matters in

a way that would not mean Mary being disgraced or even executed. Joseph was a righteous man and he acted mercifully to Mary.

The fourth thing the Bible tells us about Joseph is that he listened to God. It says an angel appeared to Joseph in a dream and told him that the baby Mary was carrying was from the Holy Spirit. Joseph believed that God was fulfilling a prophesy. He believed that this was all about bringing Emmanuel God with us. So Joseph didn't say, "Count me out." Instead he took Mary as his wife and became foster father to the Son of God.

So keep Joseph in your thoughts this Christmas; a righteous man, a man who followed God's laws, a man who followed God's example of mercy and grace, a man who listened to God and followed God's directions. Joseph was an integral part of God's plan to bring Emmanuel God with us into our world. Mary gave birth to Emmanuel but Joseph nurtured and protected Emmanuel.

We should try to be like Joseph and allow ourselves to be used as instruments of bringing God's presence into our world. Like

Joseph we should be righteous, merciful and gracious. Like him we should listen to God and heed God's word. Like Joseph we should nurture the presence of God with us. That way the world shall know Emmanuel - God is with us!

Through the decades 1990s

In 1991 Crufts celebrated its centenary, organised by The Kennel Club it celebrates every aspect of the role that dogs play in our lives. In the same year Tim Berners-Lee invented the world wide

web.

In 1992 the fire took place at Windsor Castle. It burned for 15 hours and destroyed 115 rooms including 9 state rooms. Bill Clinton was elected President of the USA.




In 1993 Bobby Moore, England footballer, died aged 51 years.

In 1998 Google was founded. It became one of the most popular search engines on the internet.

In 1999 Lindsay Davenport won her only Wimbledon title and Pete Sampras won his third consecutive Wimbledon title.

Prime Ministers of Great Britain during this decade were John Major and Tony Blair.

Presidents of USA were George Bush and Bill Clinton.

Deaths during the decade included actor and singer Frank Sinatra, aged 82 years, actress Ava Gardner aged 67 years, singer Anne Shelton aged 70 years, actress Greta Garbo aged 84 years, singer John Denver, aged 53 years, comedians Frankie Howerd aged 75 years and Benny Hill aged 68 years.







Why we eat Mince Pies at Christmas

Thanks to a tradition from the Middle Ages, which saw people eat a mince pie for 12 days from Christmas day to Twelfth Night, these little bites of bliss have become very popular during the festive period. Doing this was believed to bring you happiness for the next 12 months!

One of the favourite sweet treats at Christmas is the mince pie. This crumbly pastry is filled with fruit, often soaked in brandy and flavoured with citrus and mild spice. However, the mince pie was originally a savoury pie – and not even round!

In the Tudor period they were rectangular, shaped like a manger and often had a pastry baby Jesus on the lid. They were made from 13 ingredients to represent Jesus and his disciples and were all symbolic to the Christmas story. As well as dried fruit such as raisins, prunes and figs, they included lamb or mutton to represent the shepherds and spices (cinnamon, cloves and nutmeg) for the Wise Men. It was only later, post Reformation, that the mince pie adopted a round shape.

Even today there are traditions associated with mince pies. When making the mincemeat mixture for the pies, for good luck it should be stirred in a clockwise direction. You should always make a wish when eating the first mince pie of the season and you should never cut one with a knife.
