#### Christmas is coming!

Perhaps you are excited, writing Christmas cards, planning special menus, organising family visits, and singing Christmas carols.

Perhaps you are already fed up of seeing
Christmas decorations and Christmas food in the shops.
Perhaps you are preparing for a different type of Christmas this year, with new members of the family, or without others.
Perhaps you are wondering how we can sing 'Peace on Earth' with everything going on around the world.

This year the Church of England's theme for Advent and Christmas this year is Joy. Thinking about joy I have come to realise it is different from happiness. The main difference is that happiness is often a temporary emotion linked to what is happening around us, while joy is a deeper, more lasting feeling that comes from within. Happiness can be short lived, whereas joy is a more consistent, sense of well-being or contentment

Loving another human being and being loved by someone brings us immense joy. Many people find joy in doing work they love. But, for Christians, the greatest and most enduring joy comes from knowing God through Jesus Christ and being a part of his joyful kingdom.

At Christmas God came to earth in Jesus, fully human as well as fully divine, as a tiny baby, born in a dark and smelly stable, not in a palace or a castle. Jesus came to give us life in abundance (John 10.10), and that life is one of joy. At Christmas we celebrate Jesus' birth, together with people around the world, and we are joyful, because it reminds us how much God loves each and every one of us.

Whatever you are feeling this year about Christmas, come and celebrate with us in church, we would love to see you and share

Christmas with you (the you will find all our benefice services in this magazine).

Share your love with those around you, Brother, sister, mum and dad, Warming hearts and lifting spirits, 'Tis the season to be glad!







## St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr 26 December

#### St Stephen was appointed as one of the first deacons

The early Christian community in Jerusalem faced confusion over the fair distribution of food to the poor and widows.

In order to solve this problem the apostles appointed seven men, including Stephen, to serve as deacons, a role that allowed the apostles to focus on their preaching and teaching.

#### St Stephen was known as a fervent preacher

Stephen was known for his eloquent speeches and performed miracles, making many converts.

His powerful sermons and direct criticism of the Jewish leaders for their role in Jesus's death led to accusations of blasphemy.

He was brought before the Sanhedrin, the supreme Jewish court, where he delivered a speech recounting the history of Israel and accusing the leaders of resisting the Holy Spirit and murdering the prophets who foretold Jesus's arrival.

#### St Stephen was a visionary and martyr

As he was speaking, Stephen reportedly had a vision of Jesus standing at the right hand of God, which he shared with the court. **This** enraged the crowd who dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.


As the stones rained down, Stephen's last words were a prayer to "receive my spirit" and a plea to God, "do not hold this sin against them," mirroring Jesus's prayer on the cross.

#### The legacy of St Stephen

Stephen's martyrdom led to increased persecution, which scattered many Christians from Jerusalem and helped spread Christianity to new areas.

His unwavering faith and ultimate act of forgiveness deeply impacted the early church.

Saul of Tarsus, who would later become the apostle Paul, was present and approved of Stephen's execution, and Stephen's martyrdom is said to have been a pivotal moment in Saul's conversion.



Dear Lord,

we thank You for giving us St. Stephen as an example of holiness. Help us to imitate the love of You he showed in choosing to devote himself to Your service as a deacon in the early Church.





#### **Holocaust Memorial Day – 27 January**

The word 'holocaust' is a compound of the Greek words holos ("completely") and kaustos ("burnt"). It originally referred to a specific type of religious sacrifice, particularly in ancient Greek and Jewish traditions, where an animal was fully consumed by fire. It was used in its general sense of "burnt offering" or "destruction by fire" for centuries, and later used metaphorically for a large-scale massacre.


The Holocaust is central to Holocaust Memorial Day when we remember the six million Jewish men, women and children who were murdered. We also commemorate the millions more people murdered through the Nazi persecution of other groups and the genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. The Holocaust Memorial Day Trust encourages remembrance in a world scarred by prejudice and systematic, targeted persecution.

The date for Holocaust Memorial Day was chosen to remember that on the morning of 27 January 1945 the Auschwitz-Birkenau camps, still holding some 7,000 prisoners, was liberated. Over a million people deported to Auschwitz perished there. It is estimated that six million Jews were exterminated in the death camps.

The theme for Holocaust Memorial Day 2026, 'Bridging Generations', is a call-to-action. A reminder that the responsibility of remembrance doesn't end with the survivors - it lives on through their children, their grandchildren and through all of us. This theme encourages us all to engage actively with the past - to listen, to learn and to carry those lessons forward. By doing so, we build a

bridge between memory and action, between history and hope for the future.

As the years pass, we're growing more distant in time from the Holocaust and from the other, more recent genocides that are



commemorated on Holocaust Memorial Day. That distance brings a risk – memory fades and the sharp reality of what happened becomes blurred, abstract or even questioned.

Bridging Generations highlights the crucial role of the next generation in preserving the memory of the Holocaust and carrying it forward. It highlights the power of intergenerational dialogue – of listening to those who came before us and of sharing those stories with those who come after. In doing so, we don't just preserve memory – we connect it to the present.

Genocide doesn't discriminate by age: infants, children, adults and the elderly have all experienced unimaginable suffering in different ways. In many cases, entire family lines were erased. *Bridging Generations* invites us to honour each life – and honour those who left no family to carry their legacy – whose


