



Thanks also to the wonderfully talented people who made handcrafted items for us to sell, helping us to raise further funds.





Artist for the Day of Prayer 2024: Halima Aziz "Praying Palestinian Women"

The artwork, shows three Palestinian women praying together in a peaceful, outdoor space and is aptly named 'Praying Palestinian Women'.



Halima has used motifs and symbols which indicate the origin and



cohesiveness of these women: Olive trees are a sign of everlasting and abundant life because they can live for thousands of years. The Palestinian people are deeply rooted in their country and this is underlined by the golden roots of the tree. Poppy flowers are abundant and meaningful as they are a reminder of loved ones who have given their lives for their country. Traditional Palestinian dress such as the tatreez (embroidery), thobe (dress) or the white scarf symbolise the people's creativity and their country's rich heritage. The keys are a symbol of the hope to return back to Palestine.

My Life as a TV and film "Extra"

I've been an extra for 30 plus years and I have enjoyed every minute of it, juggling my 'bread and butter' jobs with stage and clubs, modelling, auditions for adverts and taking part in the adverts themselves. As in most showbusiness ranks it is an extremely busy and tiring job going round talking to W I and old people's clubs about TV work, filming and modelling. They usually say, "Oh, so you are only an 'Extra then', you work in the background." Which I have to retort most strongly that, "No we are not just extras. They are the non-equity people picked up off the street to fill in a space. These people often cost the film, TV and video people a lot of money on takes because they don't know what to do or they keep changing their dress/clothes after each take, etc. We are artistes in our own right; club turns, DJs, models, actors, dancers, instrumentalists, teachers, singers including local opera stars. One thing that I also include, and maybe I should not, is that a walk-on is asked or told to do

something and it has to be done on the spot, sometimes with little rehearsal. The main stream actors/principals have the script for weeks and many rehearsals prior to the camera rehearsals and takes. So, an "extra"/walk-on really has to know their job which also, as the stars admit, help them with theirs.



People ask me what we talk about on set. Well, most of the time it is mime talk (animation) and the murmurs/murmurings are put on sound later if it is required. This is also the case for the sounds of traffic, tractors, animal noises, etc. Also with clapping and laughter at meetings and even doors closing. Sometime we are asked to actually speak but 'low' and not to refer to TV programme themes, particularly Emmerdale, or the people, just generalisations basically. All good fun!

Being a walk-on artiste lets you automatically join an exclusive

club. When you are down, the others will all gather around and perk you up be it at the studios, or by telephone calls or cards. If you have been bereaved, they are the most supportive of people to help you over the bereft period, you are never at a low for long (unfortunately you have to come home to an empty house) but, for a while at least, you can forget and live again for the moment. Professionals are some of the best people you can work with, they help and assist you through your downmost moments and, when you are called to action stations, the full professionalism takes over for the take, then it is back to support. I always remember one lady who lost her husband and started crying floods of tears on set. We all surrounded her grief until she managed to control herself again. (This is an act that all walk-ons have perfected in our assistance to our screen brothers and sisters to help them cope and come back to normality. It is remembered and appreciated by all.)

The walk-ons also make and keep as friends, the principals. One memory I have is one day I was booked for a slot on Emmerdale Farm (before it dropped the 'farm'). I was in the studio canteen on Kirkstall Road, all on my own, the only other people there were 2 canteen staff preparing the counters for lunch. In walked a dream of a lady, long legs, high heels, very fetching. She got a coffee and came to sit near me. I nodded and smiled, she acknowledged me and came over, cup in hand and said, "Excuse me, may I sit with

you please?" Of course, I said yes. She then told me that she was a stranger up here and she was booked on a short contract with Emmerdale Farm. She was replacing Catherine Barker as Dolly, she was Jean Rogers. So, I told her I was Dennis and from that day to this we have been best of friends even though she has now, unfortunately, left Emmerdale. That lady started the whole line of the most glamorous ladies in soaps as they, as a line up, beat any of the other soaps.



That same year, at Christmas, on the final walk-on day filming before breaking up (the stars still had a couple to do), Dolly "Jean Rogers" came over to our table with a couple of bottles of wine for us. It was never done before and has never been done since. That is the woman she is. Thanks, Jean!

I am glad to say I can still number 2 dozen stars who are still personal friends after many years with Emmerdale and other programmes. I am well known for my scrap books, photos, paper cuttings, panto leaflets sent by stars. Diane Davies is usually the first received and the others follow. One year I did the dirty on

Christopher Chittell (Eric Pollard) at York. I had understood him to be the Dame but he was the lead baddy, Ebeneezer. I got a bouquet of 'flowers'; cauliflowers, spray of sprouts, spray of carrots, couple of leeks and I forget what else. The lady at my local florist did me proud. Chris was taken aback but it provided him with all his veg for him and his family for Christmas and Boxing Day. That will be one he will not forget, a good friend to have. As is Tony Pitts (Archie Brooks), glad to see him popping up in the occasional play and soap.



Yes, over the years, I have been in many soaps, series and plays but one for Granada had us for a while rehearsing 2 dances in formation in beautiful costumes and evening dress, then 3 days of dress rehearsals with Principals in the studio on set then final 2 days of takes. I lost a stone (honest) and we got the dances off to perfection, but we were never used in the final edit, how I wish I could have seen the final numbers, as we worked our socks off and we never saw the end products. Such is life! I don't think I should write the production name here as I may be breaking rules/copywrite, but it is true that some of us proper dancers trained those who couldn't dance but not to a high standard. It was two wonderful but tiring weeks but, as I say, no end product to pat our

backs with, sometimes that is a walk-on's lot. It doesn't often get to me but this one programme did and I felt cheated as did the others who were chosen.

To continue with the question of talking, I have to mention that the new microphones can pick up a hair blowing in the wind, they are tuned in so well, so we really have to stay dumb in the background or the star's dialogue would be over spoken and it could be trouble for them, us and the sound editor. We are often asked to reveal the storyline by other people, but we don't. There is an unwritten law that forbids us from doing so and really many times, as in Emmerdale, 17 pub scenes are filmed in one day and they are filmed in any order, not in sequence, so we have to watch for ourselves when it is transmitted to find out which is what and fits in to what we did on set. We don't in all fairness see the full story line.

Coronation Street is different, they usually film three weeks in advance in transmitted sequence order but we are cleared after each pub (the Rovers) scene so we don't see the set stories being done, so again we don't get the full story.

I do hope you all find this meander exposé of interest.

God is with us in this dark world, said Bishop Nick in his Christmas message



God comes into the difficult world we find ourselves in to be with us, the Bishop of Leeds, the Rt Revd Nick Baines, said in his Christmas message.

In a year of darkness and uncertainty, Bishop Nick spoke of the conflicts in Israel and Gaza, Ukraine and Sudan, and of "the baby who opts into this world", bringing Christmas hope by being with His people, not apart from them.

Bishop Nick said that, "God chooses to come among us as one of us, subject to everything the world can throw at us, and doesn't walk away from it."

He also talked of the message of Christmas: "It's not merely romantic or escapist, but actually it goes to the heart of what Christian faith has to say.

"God among us as one of us; not exempting us from all that the world involves, that being human involves, that being mortal involves, but saying I will never leave you, I will never forsake you, and whatever comes your way, I have walked that path before you."

Royal Opera House comes to Bradford to sing for Ukraine

Over 350 people came to Bradford Cathedral on Sunday, December 10 for 'Songs for Ukraine Chorus', a Christmas Concert collaboration with Royal Opera House.

'Songs for Ukraine' is a creative exchange between the Royal Opera House and displaced Ukrainians produced by ROH Learning & Participation.

The concert featured the Songs for Ukraine Choir alongside, from Bradford, the Fiyalka and Dibrova choirs, as well as lay clerks from Bradford Cathedral and the Grace Notes, the Cathedral's young community choir.

The Revd Ned Lunn, Canon for Intercultural Mission and the Arts, said: "It was wonderful to welcome the Ukrainian choirs from the Royal Opera House and Bradford to join with our own Grace Notes choir for a poignant event of music and reflections.

"It demonstrated the strength of our unique offer to the City of Culture 2025 as a place to host events of this nature and size."



Together in love Bishop Anna

One evening in December, having got through security, I sat alongside teenagers and volunteers in the Faith Space at Wetherby Young Offenders Institution delighted to be at their carol service. The invitation had come from its chaplaincy team and was one of the carol services I attended at the invitation of different chaplaincies working across the Ripon Area.

The service at Wetherby felt vulnerable and tough, all at once, while exuding a joy hard to imagine would be possible. With St Aidan's school, Harrogate, its service was polished, but certainly not a performance - every song and reading came from the heart and the church was filled with a profound spirit and energy of youth; and Leyburn Auction Mart's was real, earthy and shone with the need we have of each other when working relentlessly against the odds. In each and every place Jesus was there in hearts, minds and the body gathered as one.

As I've dipped into various chaplaincies over the years there is something in them all which I admire and am drawn to. Chaplains work



at the sharp end of the Kingdom of God. They are one of the best examples of ecumenism and inter-faith work, as differences are laid aside to simply respond compassionately to deep human need. As a Christian, in chaplains, I observe Jesus at work who goes out to the margins and the front line, sees the child in all and responds with God's healing word and action. And in the work of chaplaincies we see that God's redemption can be found even in the darkest corner and all things really are being made new.

As we start this New Year. hopefully with fresh eyes and renewed strength, we can give thanks and be inspired by the example chaplaincies give us. Our world is divided and hurting, but what matters is how we respond, together, in love. What matters as Christians is meeting human need with compassion in and way beyond our churches. What matters, is joining in with Jesus to heal the earth, comfort God's people and make all things new.

Rural Forum considers 'missing generation' at Ripon Cathedral

The struggles of young people living in rural areas were the topic of a recent Rural Forum held at Ripon Cathedral.

Two years ago The North Yorkshire Rural Commission, chaired by the Dean of Ripon, the Very Revd John Dobson, found that there is a missing generation in North Yorkshire; a staggering 45,000 fewer 18 to 45-year-olds than expected for the size of population.

At Ripon Cathedral's Rural Forum younger people from that 'missing' generation told delegates that finding affordable housing and secure employment in their home county were key challenges that made living in rural North Yorkshire difficult, even for those with higher degrees.

Dean John said: "Every community wants to see its children and younger people have the opportunity to grow and flourish, not least in their home area, if they wish to stay there.

"It is tragic that so many young people from this area are unable to stay in their own area.

"There is a moral issue here, a question of how we can enable older generations to ensure justice for the young.

"Equally, the common good is often served by young people having the opportunity to move into the region to provide skills upon which we all depend."

"It was a privilege to be invited to Buckingham Palace as one of a group of ten women and have such important conversations and with the King taking an active part," Revd Jenny said.

"Our table of women were incredible - each from different faith backgrounds and all engaged in interfaith dialogue or community

or community cohesion in various different ways."

She said how King Charles joined each table to hear the conclusions of their discussions. "He was very attentive, listened to our ideas and was encouraging and positive. At the very least, it was great to see people from different faiths gathered together at Buckingham

Palace, wonderful to see women and young people given such prominence, and encouraging that we all felt heard.

"The King sat with us to listen to our discussions, which included our concerns about the Israel-Hamas conflict on communities here in the UK and practical solutions to bringing diverse communities together in meaningful ways.

"It was especially encouraging that the King wished to hear the voices of women - actively recognising our contribution to dialogue and peacemaking and we left excited by the possibilities for working together moving forwards. It was definitely a day to remember!" Revd Jenny said.

Connecting with 'God with us'

It's one of the paradoxes of modern life that the more 'connected' we are, through social media, video calls and other technologies, the more 'disconnected' we also feel from one another. This can be particularly true in the month of January, as the hubbub and connections of the Christmas season fade, the long cold nights are still with us and the weather drives us indoors.

The epidemic of loneliness is one which impacts all communities with a landmark report commissioned by the British Red Cross and The Coop in 2016 finding that over 9 million people are affected by loneliness in the UK.

We would do worse at this time of the year to remember one of the names of Jesus that we spent so much time reflecting on over the previous season, that of Immanuel, God with us. The truth of the Christmas season is a God who enters into the world with all its loneliness and isolation and promises to be with us.

He also is a God who having



invited us in, calls us to invite others to receive a welcome into community. One of the ways that many of our churches choose to do this is through opening up their spaces for those who are feeling isolated and lonely. In community cafes, and coffee mornings across the Diocese we find a simple and yet profound expression of the good news of connection and welcome. At Wellsprings Together we have the privilege of supporting many of these spaces through our Places of Welcome Network which is national network of churches and other community organisations. Each venue opens its doors every week to offer free refreshments in an inclusive, non-judgemental environment, one in which people can relax, share their stories and their concerns and find friendship and blessing.

Reflecting on her visit with the auction mart's chaplain Revd Chris Lawton, The Rt Revd Anna Eltringham, Bishop of Ripon said: "Unbelievable as it may sound, an auction mart is almost purpose built to act as a church if required. The auctioneer's rostrum becomes the lectern or pulpit. The sales ring was perfect for the Leyburn band and the tiered seating was great for the congregation.

"But we must not detract from the incredible place the mart is for the business of farming and the community which surrounds it. We learnt from the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institute, (a charity that helps farming families in any kind of need), how important the mart is simply as a place for those who farm to connect and talk and support one another. Farming is relentless hard graft and can be quite isolating in the dales or on the moors, so being with those who 'get it' can be a life-line."



crafts and thought about the meaning of the Christingle.



Through the decades the 2000s

The new millennium was welcomed all over the world with fireworks and celebration. Luckily worries about the Y2K bug, which was projected to create havoc with computers and networks at the start of 2000, were largely unfounded. The International



Space Station became fully operational with the arrival of its first resident crew.

2001 was the year of the 9/11 disaster when planes were hi-jacked by al-Qaeda and flown into the World Trade Centre in New York and the Pentagon in Washington. Apple's iPod went on sale towards the end of the year; this being one of the most ground breaking devices of the decade.

In 2002 the euro became the sole currency in 12 European countries; the mark, lira and other currency ceased to be legal tender. In the same year, led by the play of Ronaldo, Brazil defeated Germany to win its fifth World Cup.



In 2003 the Disney Pixar animation film, Finding Nemo was very popular. The final film in the trilogy Lord of the Rings, The Return of the King, was released. Also, the first of the Pirates of the Caribbean films; The Curse of the Black Pearl was shown.

2004 saw the launch of Facebook and became the world's largest social media platform.

In 2005 the TV show Dr Who returned to our screens, with David Tennant as the Doctor, more than 25 years after it's initial run ended. Pope John Paul II, one of the most popular popes, passed away at the age of 84 years. Soon after, Jospeh Ratzinger was enthroned as Pope Benedict XVI.

Pluto, the farthest planet from the sun in our solar system, was demoted and given the new classification of dwarf planet in 2006.

The Internet retailer Amazon.com debuts the Kindle in 2007. A wireless electronic reading device, it became huge success and it popularised e-books. In the same year a mortgage crisis hit the UK and quickly spread around the world triggering a great recession.

In 2008 NASA revealed the first photograph of Mercury's previously unseen side and in the same year The Large Hadron Collider, the world's most powerful particle accelerator, situated near Geneva in Switzerland, ran its first test operation.

In 2009 Barak Obama was sworn in as the 44th President of the United States, becoming the first African American to hold office. The film Avatar had its world premiere this year, it went on to dethrone the blockbuster Titanic (1997) as the world's highest grossing film. Both films were produced by James Cameron.

UK Prime Ministers during this decade were Tony Blair and Gordon Brown. US Presidents were Bill Clinton, George W Bush and Barak Obama.

Deaths during the decade included the King of Pop, Michael Jackson, the star of the Superman movies, Christopher Reeve and the former Beatle, George Harrison. Probably best known for his role in the film, Bridge over the River Kwai, for which he won an Academy Award, and also for his role in Star Wars, Alec Guinness, also died, as did Hedy Lemarr (actress and technology pioneer), Walter Matthau and Sir John Gielgud.
