The Transfiguration of our Lord - 6 August 2023

The Transfiguration was the glorification of the human body of Jesus. On this occasion His body underwent a change in form, a metamorphosis, so that it shone as brightly as the sun. At the time of the Transfiguration, Jesus' earthly ministry was coming to a close. He had acknowledged that He was the Messiah and predicted His death and resurrection. Now He was to reveal, to a select few, His divine glory.

Jesus took Peter, James, and John his brother brought them up on a high mountain by themselves, and was transfigured before them. his face shone like the sun, and his clothes became as white as the light. And behold, Moses and Elijah appeared to them, talking with him . . . A bright cloud overshadowed them; and suddenly a voice came out of the cloud, saying, 'This is my beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased. Hear him!' And when the disciples heard it, they fell on their faces and were greatly afraid. But Jesus came and touched them and said, 'Arise, and do not be afraid.' And when they had lifted up their eyes, they saw no one but Jesus only (Matthew 17:1-3,5-8).

The Transfiguration provides further evidence that Jesus was the divine Son of God. It is not coincidental that this happened soon after Jesus had acknowledged Himself to be the Christ, the one who left heaven's glory to come to earth. Now three of His disciples were to get a glimpse of that glory.

The appearance of Moses and Elijah with Jesus is highly significant. The name Moses was equated with the Old Testament law that God had given to the people. Jesus came and fulfilled the commandments of the law and did the things the law could not do, that is, to provide an answer for the problem of sin. The law pointed out the problem; Jesus gave the solution.

Elijah was an outstanding figure in the Old Testament. He was a great prophet and his appearance with Moses on the Mount of Transfiguration testified that Jesus fulfilled the prophets, as well as the law.

The voice of God the Father gave further confirmation of the calling and Sonship of Jesus. He acknowledged that Jesus had pleased Him in the things He had said and done.

The Transfiguration of our Lord is celebrated on 9th Sunday of Trinity, this year 6 August.



The Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla

On Saturday, 6th May 2023 King Charles III and Queen Camilla were crowned in Westminster Abbey.

Many people from all over the world attended the Coronation both inside and outside the Abbey and thousands of others watched it on the television.

The guest list inside the Abbey included the Prince and Princess of Wales, Prince George, Princess Charlotte and Prince Louis. Prince Harry, the Princess Royal, Prince Andrew, the Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh and many other members of the Royal Family.

Foreign royalty included the Kings and Queens of Spain, Greece, Belgium and Jordan and the Prince and Princess of Monaco joined by many leaders of overseas governments. The Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, attended along with past Prime Ministers including John Major, David Cameron and Theresa May. Celebrities including Davis Beckham, Joanna Lumley and Kelly Holmes were also in attendance.

The entire service was so colourful and brought back many happy thoughts and memories of our dear Queen's Coronation in 1953.

The prayers and music were lovely, Zadok the Priest, Praise My Soul The King Of Heaven and the National Anthem.

The highlight for many members of the public, who had patiently waited, was to see members of the Royal Family on the balcony at Buckingham Palace at the end of the Coronation Day.

King Charles III was the eldest child of Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip. He was later joined by Princess Anne, Prince Andrew and Prince Edward.

Long may King Charles III reign.





Diocese of Leeds gains its first Eco Church Gold Award

Faith and dedication at St Mary's, Embsay with Eastby, have earned it the first Gold Eco Church award in our diocese.

A Rocha UK Eco Church assessors visited St Mary's earlier this month to judge their bid for the rare Gold Award and Parish Environment Officer, Diana Linford, responded to the good news "We have a small, but very active Eco Group at St Mary's and have the strong support of our vicar and congregation. We do feel that caring for Creation is embedded in the life of our church community and we are delighted to have received the Gold Eco Church Award."

St Mary's Revd Canon Marion Russell commented: "It's a great honour and we are grateful for the Eco Church Award structure and encouragement that



comes for A Rocha UK to guide us to think and act more deeply with awareness of caring for God's creation. We are committed to continuing our journey through learning more and sharing in our community and with other churches and groups."

St Mary's is one of only 33 churches in England and Wales to have won a Gold Award.

Diocesan Environment Officer Jemima Parker added her congratulations: "This is a tremendous result and shows just what can be achieved – well done St Mary's!"


Church roof repairs set Spidey senses tingling

Passers-by in Skipton could be forgiven for thinking Spiderman was in town recently as nimble figure clambered over the roof of Christ Church and abseiled down the church tower.

In fact they were members of a team of specialist roofers contracted to carry out repairs to the Grade II* listed Victorian building in Cross Street.

Instead of using expensive scaffolding, the team from Vertex Specialist Roofing, based in Rotherham, South Yorkshire, use ropes and harnesses, and the sort of skills more usually associated with rock climbing, to repair difficult to access roofs.

They are carrying out necessary repairs to the slates, downpipes and guttering on the church.

Welcome to June, and we've got a busy month ahead of us! Our current deacons will be ordained priest at the end of this month in the Episcopal Areas, and Bishop Nick will ordain this year's new deacons at Bradford Cathedral on Saturday, July 1.

We're also in the middle of a season of encouraging volunteering. Six million people across the UK participated in "The Big Help Out" over the Coronation weekend, celebrating and encouraging volunteering in our communities. Churches and other faith communities led the way in helping to re-build a volunteer base that had been severely dented by the COVID pandemic. The /Together coalition, of which I'm vice chair, helped to organise that, we've got Volunteering Week on June 1-7, and we're following those up with the third annual national "Thank You Day" on Sunday, July 2.

Gratitude sits at the heart of our Christian faith. Many of us were brought up with the beautiful BCP General Thanksgiving that begins, "Almighty God, Father of all mercies, we thine unworthy servants do give thee most humble and hearty thanks for all thy goodness and loving-kindness to us and to all men..." Thank You Day is an opportunity together, as a nation, to bring our communities together to say thank you.



This year, there is a particular way in which our parishes and chaplaincies can be involved. In partnership with the charity, Music For Dementia, we are encouraging our communities to show our appreciation for Britain's un-sung army of carers: family members, neighbours, friends and careworkers, with a particular focus on those who look after people with dementia. Tony "Is This The Way To Amarillo" Christie is rerecording "Thank You For Being A Friend" by Andrew Gold, and we'd love to see churches partner with others in their neighbourhoods in taking a pop-up choir to visit a local care-home.

We're in the middle of a cost of living crisis, with wars and so much else that can pull our eyes and our hearts down. But the Apostle Paul's most joyful letter (to the Philippians) was written from prison, and I've been inspired by our friends in the Episcopal Church of Sudan, where life is unspeakably difficult at the moment. They have not stopped giving thanks to God and neither should we.

To fix our eyes on Jesus

"Change" is often heard as a negative word for many parishes. Whether it's because we inherently look for stability in a fragile world, or because our experience of change is often challenging, when that word is uttered it's almost like a shiver goes through people.

Yet as Christians we are constantly called to be renewed and transformed by God – to be changed. As the church we are called to proclaim afresh the gospel for each generation, to go into the darkness with Christ's light - to bring change. We follow a God who often calls people out from where they are, to establish them in a new place - bringing change. It is the substance of life and faith that change constantly happens!

It is however still fairly scary. As someone who has lived in many different places so far in life and been part of various churches along the way with diverse expressions of worship, change is more normalised and yet still



unsettling. If you are a small parish faced with declining numbers, little finance, and big questions about your future, where most people have worshipped their whole lives, change is deeply difficult, despite being necessary for new life.

As I journey with two such parishes in West Bradford, I am aware more than ever of the need to fix our eyes on Jesus. I often return to this verse: "let us run with perseverance, the race marked out for us, fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith." (Hebrews 12:2). I also often think of the early church and how it must have been both exhilarating and unsettling, being sent out to share the gospel with people of different languages, cultures and religions.

The 1950's

Brighter times in the years of the 1950's after the war years of the 1940'2.

In 1950 Princess Anne was born. In the same year C S Lewis published the Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe. In 1951 the Festival of Britain took place, one of the last events being the first Miss World Contest. It was won by Miss Sweden, Kiki Haakinson.

In 1952 H M King George VI died at the age of 56 years. Queen Mary, his mother, died in March 1953 just ten weeks before her granddaughter, H M Queen Elizabeth II, was crowned. In May of

the same year Mount Everest was climbed by Sir Edmund Hillary and Tenzing Norgay. Ian Fleming published his first James Bond book, Casino Royale and the structure of DNA, the building block of life, was discovered by James Watson and Francis Crick.




In 1954 food rationing, that had been introduced during WW2, was officially brought to an end as food supplies improved. Also, medical student, Roger Bannister, ran a mile in under 4 minutes.

1955 was the year that fashion designer, Mary Quant, famous for the mini skirt, opened her first shop 'Bazaar' in Chelsea, London.

In 1956 Grace Kelly married Prince Rainier of Monaco. Britain's

first nuclear power station opened at Windscale and Elvis had his first hit in the UK, Heartbreak Hotel.



third attempt to take off from a slush covered runway at Munich Airport. Among the injured were Sir Matt Busby, Bobby Charlton



and a young Duncan Edwards died at the age of only 21 years. Michael Bond published his book, A Bear Called Paddington.

In 1959 the first Mini motor car was built by British Motoring Corporation and the first postal postcodes were introduced in Norwich.

Prime Ministers of the 1950's were Clement Attlee (1945 – 1951), Winston Churchill (1951 – 1955), Anthony Eden (1955 – 1957) and Harold Macmillan (1957 – 1963).

American Presidents were Harry S Truman (1945 – 1953) and Dwight D Eisenhower (1953 – 1961).

The fifties saw the 'rock and roll' years of many stars like Bill Haley and His Comets, Chuck Berry and Elvis Presley. It originated from

jazz, rhythm and blues, boogie woogie and country music but the genre did not get its name until 1954.

Notable deaths of the decade included the actor Humphrey Bogart, Broadway star Al Jolson, James Dean aged 24 years and Buddy Holly aged only 22 years.

Here's to the next decade.




