

Trinity Sunday - 4 June 2023

Have you heard the story about a little girl in Sunday school drawing with all her crayons? Her teacher asked her what she was drawing. "I'm drawing a picture of God," the little girl responded. "But nobody knows what God looks like," her teacher said. To which the little girl replied, "They will when I'm finished." There is some sense in what that little girl was



doing. To draw a picture of God, to know what God looks like, to know what God is all about is what one hopes and expects is behind the place we call church. And it is what one of our most confusing doctrines is all about—the doctrine of the Trinity.

Trinity Sunday, the Sunday after Pentecost, a day the Christian Church historically has celebrated one of its central beliefs, "God in three persons, blessed Trinity,". The Bible teaches us that God lives in three persons, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Each person is equal is stature to the other. This is very difficult to understand or explain.

The problem with the doctrine of the Trinity is that there is no one place to look for it in the Bible. The Trinity is not an explicit teaching of the Bible. In fact, the word Trinity is not even used in the Bible.

The 3 persons in the Trinity do different things:

God works for us

Jesus Christ works in us

The Holy Spirit works thorough us

But how one + one + one = one is still pretty much a mystery. The Triune God will never be understood through doctrines. The Father, Son and Holy Spirit will best be known through a life of service and worship. So, the next time someone asks you to explain the Trinity to them, remember the following story, as related by Desmond Tutu. "Anthony Bloom, the Orthodox master of the spiritual life told the story of a simple Russian country priest who was confronted by an eminent scientist. This chap trotted out apparently devastating arguments against the existence

of God and declared, "I don't believe in God." The priest retorted quickly, "Oh, it doesn't matter--God believes in you."

And that's what it all boils down to: God believes in us all. Whether we understand the Trinity or not, because God believes in us all, we are able to worship and serve God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

Last month, as we mentioned, we had Lent Lunches. Every year we donate the funds we make to Charity. This year we chose Martin House Children's Hospice in Wetherby. We made the fantastic amount of £600. (See the letter on page 9.)

We spoke to Duncan from the Hospice, to ask if we could do more for the children, as we have a knit and natter group with Friends Of St Botolph's. We have decided to knit baby items so that they can be sold by the Hospice to make money. 

Through the Decades The 1940's

During the decade of the 1940's, WW2 was taking place. Neville Chamberlain, Clement Atlee and Winston Churchill were Prime Ministers.

In 1941 the aviator, Amy Johnson, died aged 37 years. She was the first woman to fly solo from London to Australia. She was born in Hull and is believed to have died in an aviation accident.



In 1942 the George Cross was awarded to the

island of Malta by King George VI. This was to "bear witness to the heroism and devotion of its people" after withstanding a great siege by Germany and Italy.

During the war years Vera Lynn was the forces sweetheart and her songs included the White Cliffs of Dover, Yours and We'll Meet Again. We remember Anne Shelton, Henry Hall, Geraldo, George Formby, Arthur Askey (catchphrase 'Hello Playmates') and the stars of E.N.S.A., the Entertainments National Service Association.

Films of the 1940's included Mrs Miniver, Lady Hamilton, Now Voyager, Rebecca, Going My Way, Casablanca and the song White Christmas was sung by Bing Crosby in Holiday Inn. A





young Elizabeth Taylor starred alongside Lassie.

We remember many British stars of the 40's like Anna Neagle, Margaret Lockwood, James Mason, Charles Laughton, John Mills and Phyllis Calvert.

Many famous events took place during the war years; the Battle of Britain, Dunkirk, the D-Day landings and the attack on Pearl Harbour. All of which had effects for years to come. We remember

Anne Frank and her famous diary and, in 1945, V E day took place.

American Presidents during this decade were Franklin D Roosevelt (1933 - 1945) and Harry S Truman (1945 - 1953). Truman ordered the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki so ending the war with Japan.



Deaths in the 1940's included the author of the much loved Tales of Peter Rabbit, Beatrix



Potter, Neville Chamberlain, HRH The Duke of Kent, Leslie Howard, David Lloyd George and the film actress Carole Lombard, the wife of Clark Gable, died while selling war bonds.

In 1947 Princess Elizabeth married Prince Philip.

In 1948 the assassination of Mahatma Ghandi took place in India. The Olympic games were held in London. There was a hiatus because of the was so these were the first games since 1936 when they were held in Berlin. The athletes included Emil Zatopec, the Czech long distance runner, and Fanny Blankers-Koen, the Dutch track and field athlete, who won 4 gold medals, She was 30 years old and had the nickname, The Flying Housewife. The USA

topped the medal table with 84 medals in total, 38 of which were gold.

The NHS was founded in 1948. it was set up to provide healthcare services that are free for all and care would no longer depend on the ability to pay. It's chief architect was Labour Minister of Health, Aneurin Bevan. Prince Charles, now King Charles III, was born on 14 November.



In 1949 the American actress Rita Hayworth married her third husband, Prince Aly Khan, a Pakistani diplomat. National Service in peacetime came into force in January meaning that all physically fit males between the ages of 17 and 21 years had to serve in the armed forces for 18 months. This ended in 1960. Also in this year the first true electronic calculation of pi was done

by the ENIAC computer. It calculated pi correct to 2037 decimal places and the calculation took 70 hours!

Here's to the next decade.





The head that wears the crown Bishop Nick Baines

Shakespeare puts it perfectly: "Uneasy lies the head that wears a crown." (Henry IV, Part 2, 3.1.31)

Or, perhaps, uneasy should lie the head that wears a crown? Not all monarchs carry the burdens of headship with the humility and recognition of mortality that are vital to the task. As we look around the world, particularly at those who either crave or assume political leadership, we see people who worship power and sometimes lose sight of what (and who) that power is for.

King Charles III follows a monarch who epitomized faithfulness, service and humility for over seven decades. It is obvious already that her son has watched and learned and taken note. For power without humility becomes arrogance – it all becomes about the power-holder rather than the well-being of those who are subject to that power. Good kingship demands something different.

In the Hebrew Scriptures we read how, following the inconvenient death of the long-lived leader Moses - just as the people delivered from captivity are about to enter the so-called promised Land with all its uncertainties - Joshua is told by God to be "strong and very courageous" as he leads the people forward. So far, so good. I am sure he felt suitably encouraged.



But, this is followed by a condition: "... being careful to act accordance with all the law that my servant Moses commanded you..." (Joshua :7). In other words, power and authority are not a possession without limits.

As King Charles is crowned the next King of the United Kingdom and Commonwealth, this sense of conditional obligation clearly weighs upon him. His acknowledgment of his own need of the grace of God is essential to the wise exercise of royal power – it is this acceptance of need, rooted in humility, that affords a necessary accountability.

We must pray that at his coronation the King is imbued with the power of God's Spirit, that he might serve his people with confidence, grace, accountability and humility. This is the way to wisdom and the key to good authority.

God save the King!

Revd Canon Anna Eltringham to be the new Bishop of Ripon

The Revd Canon Anna Eltringham, currently the Team Rector for Oxted, in the Diocese of Southwark, will be the new Bishop of Ripon, Downing Street announced this morning.

She will swap Surrey's North Downs for the Yorkshire Dales and more when she becomes an Episcopal Area Bishop in the Anglican Diocese of Leeds, serving many rural parishes and varied urban communities from Ripon to Ribblehead and Richmond to Wetherby.

"Being nominated to be the next Bishop of Ripon is an honour. I am excited to serve God and his people in this place and prayerfully grow his Kingdom on earth together," Anna said.

She grew up in the West Country and studied Business and Anthropology at the University of Durham, which sparked a love of the Northern countryside.

"I have felt drawn back to the North of England for a number of years and have a strong sense of God's call to this particular role," Anna said.

The Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds said of the appointment: "I am delighted to welcome Revd Canon Anna Eltringham as the next Bishop of Ripon and to this important rural area that includes the world famous Yorkshire Dales.

"Our parishes and communities, big and small, will greet her with great warmth as her commitment to par-



ish ministry and the environment will be evident from the word go.

"Anna's pastoral care for clergy and lay leaders is evident from her previous work in the Diocese of Southwark and the wider church. She will greatly support our diocesan mission to encourage Christian confidence across the Ripon Episcopal Area and beyond."

Looking forward to her new role, Anna said: "God has laid a number of things on my heart in recent times, including a passion for climate-care and justice; care for the wellbeing of clergy and all God's people; a vision for a church that serves as much beyond as within its buildings; and children and young people at the heart of it all."

Before entering ministry, Anna worked in strategic marketing, including a role in Croydon Council where she launched a successful programme that helped local businesses cut their impact on the environment.

Whilst increasingly involved in church, community and justice work, she discerned God's call to ordained ministry, following in the footsteps of her father and previous generations in her family.

'Prayers for Sudan' held in Bradford Cathedral

A service was held at Bradford Cathedral recently to offer prayers to those caught up in the conflict that has erupted in Sudan.

The short service was led by the Rt Revd Toby Howarth, Bishop of Bradford, and included representatives from across the faiths, offering prayers and reflections.

The Revd Ludia Shukai of Great Horton and Lidget Green also spoke.

The Revd Ned Lunn, Canon for Intercultural Mission and the Arts, says: "As fighting continues in Sudan and hope for a ceasefire has crumbled, we invited people to come and pray for peace.

"The Diocese of Leeds, of which we are a part, has strong links with Sudan and with that comes personal connection with the tragedy."



St Oswald's Guisley parishioner walks to Parliament to raise funds and awareness

A parishioner from one of our Leeds area churches is walking a 'Pathway to Parliament' to raise funds and awareness for a charity supporting those with Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome.

Fran Heley currently sings in the choir of St Oswald's church in Guiseley.

Originally from London, music teacher Fran moved to Yorkshire 30 years ago and has never looked back.

Starting on Sunday May 21 Fran will be undertaking a walk from Leeds Town Hall to Parliament in aid of Ehlers-Danlos Support UK.

Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome is a genetic condition that affects the connective tissue.

The most common type of EDS involves hypermobility of the joints, but it can affect any part of the body, and lead to multiple and complex health issues which are difficult to treat.

According to EDS UK, it takes on average 10 years to get a diagnosis.

EDS UK offers advice and promotes research into the condition.

Fran said: "Four years into my journey and I am still struggling to get a formal diagnosis for EDS.

"My experience highlights the need for more research into the diagnostic process for diagnosing the condition.



"The current criteria focuses on the hypermobility of five specific joints, yet there are 300 joints in the body.

"My hypermobility is elsewhere, but has had a significant impact on my spine.

"Unfortunately, these joints do not count!

"This has had a profound impact on my life.

"I have had to stop playing the oboe and the active life that I once led is now diminishing.

"Joining the choir at St. Oswald's has been one of the best things that I have done.

"It has taken a lot of soul searching, but I no longer feel angry about my situation, and now have a greater sense of connection through the church.

"This walk is undoubtedly daunting, but I also grateful for having the opportunity to try and help the EDS community."

Art for wellbeing's sake draws a crowd to one of our churches

Some 30 people enjoyed an Art and Wellbeing workshop at Settle Parish Church, led by stained glass and community artist Linda Baines, and Shaeron Caton-Rose, an installation and printmaking artist.

Linda is also a spiritual director, and together they shared their experience of developing ReCreate, a Community Interest Company focussing on art and mental wellbeing.

They run retreats, work with community groups in Bradford and Leeds, and use art and craft to explore ideas, reflect on faith and promote mental wellbeing.

Linda and Shaeron illustrated their presentation with numerous examples of creative work, and provided a wealth of resources.

The session was also hands on, with the opportunity to explore themes of life using collage, painting, words, and images, helping participants to think about what might be required in order to set up a group for art and mental wellbeing in their own communities.

This workshop was organised by the churches of Bowland and Ewecross Deanery.

Course participant Revd Sue McWhinney said "I appreciated the opportunity to pause in the midst of a busy week, to re-connect with creativity, and to reflect on life using collage, painting, and sharing with others in a group setting."

A Christian King serving the good of all

Very Revd John Dobson Dean of Ripon



Like monarchs before him, back through the centuries to William the Conqueror, King Charles III comes to Westminster Abbey to be crowned. He does so as a twenty-first century Christian King with a clear sense of God's calling to serve the wellbeing of all within his nations and realms - Christians and people of other faiths, those with no faith and even those not supportive of monarchy.

At the beginning of the coronation service the King makes it clear that he looks to Christ, the King of kings, as the inspiration for servant leadership. Children greet him, saying, 'Children of the Kingdom of God, we welcome you in the name of the King of Kings.' To this His Majesty responds, 'In His name and after His example, I come not to be served but to serve.'

We are reminded of how much service there is to do simply because of the central role of the monarchy, 'the crown', in ensuring that the national community works for the good of all. The King promises to govern for the benefit of all. With his hand firmly on the Coronation Bible, he swears to cause law and justice, in mercy, to be executed in all his judgements, and to maintain the laws of God and the profession of the gospel. We are fortunate in having a king who, drawing on his sincere Christian faith, clearly desires to reign over an inclusive society in which all can flourish, and to see this United Kingdom serve the wellbeing of the global community, not least in defending peace and protecting the environment.

The coronation might appear to be like an ordination service on steroids. The King has a demanding vocation which he cannot fulfil in his strength alone. Central to the service, then, is his anointing with chrism, sacred oil by which the Holy Spirit itself is gifted as the unfailing source of God's strength. This takes us back through the mists of time beyond even Christ to the kings of the Old Testament. As Handel's coronation anthem reminds us. Zadok the priest and Nathan the prophet anointed Solomon king."

The anthem goes on, "And all the people rejoiced and said, 'God save the King!"' So we do the same, as King Charles is anointed, accepting God's strength to serve, following Christ's example, for the good of all people.

Pet service in Bellerby blesses pets past and present

A recent pet service in Bellerby gave people the opportunity to celebrate and pray for their pets, past and present.

The service was held in Bellerby Village Community Garden, which is next to several local farms.

Led by the Revd Stephen Hanscombe, and curate the Revd Gillian Lunn, the service was attended by several dogs of all breeds and sizes, as well as their owners.
