from the cocoon.

Sometimes struggles are exactly what we need in our lives. If God allows us to go through our lives without any obstacles, it would cripple us.

We would not be as strong as we could have been.





I am writing to say thank you so much to all the Friends of St Botolph's, for your kind gift of £600 raised through your Lent Lunches. With your help we can continue to provide expert hospice care to families across West, North and East Yorkshire, remaining with them on their journey and giving their children the best possible chance at life.

It is important that families receive our care in the setting of their choosing, so as well as coming to Martin House, we also support families at home and in hospital. Our doctors spend time at local hospitals each week - where they can see children who are on the Martin House caseload who may be in hospital. 

11th June is St Barnabas Day. Although not one of the original Twelve Apostles, Barnabas was referred to as an apostle by the early Christian Church. There is also a Church tradition, which says that Barnabas was "First of the seventy disciples of our Lord" His real name was Joseph and he came from Cyprus. He was given the nickname Barnabas, which means 'son of encouragement' for good reasons. He made a generous gift to the first Christians in Jerusalem and later he persuaded them to accept St. Paul into their number after his dramatic conversion. He also travelled with Paul both to Cyprus and later to the area we now call Turkey in order to tell others about the story of Jesus. He seems to have been someone who naturally reached out to welcome outsiders and also someone who stuck by people who had experienced a hard time or made mistakes. You can read more about him in the Bible in Acts 4:32-37; 9:26-30; 11:19-26; 13: 1-3 and 15:36-41

The symbols for Barnabas are a book, because he preached the gospel with Paul on his missionary journeys and to the people of Cyprus, and an olive branch because he was an effective peacemaker.

Father God,

Thank-you for Barnabas the encourager and all that he teaches us about encouragement.

Help us to find ways in which we can say and do encouraging things for others today.

Help us to notice others who feel left out or let down.

Thank you for the encouraging story of Jesus who can helps us become encouragers.



Diocese marks 10th anniversary with service at Bradford Cathedral



The Diocese of Leeds has marked its 10th anniversary with a special service at Bradford Cathedral.

The service was in part led by the Most Revd Stephen Cottrell, Archbishop of York, who has been visiting our region as part of the celebrations, and was attended by civic dignitaries from across the diocese.

The service featured worship led by the Bradford Cathedral Choir and the worship band from Fountains Church Bradford, and was organised by the Revd Pete Gunstone, Minor Canon for Worship & Nurture at Bradford Cathedral.

Archbishop Stephen was welcomed by the Bishop of Leeds, the Rt Revd Nick Baines, before moving to a time of hearing about the work of God in our five episcopal areas. As part of his sermon Archbishop Stephen said: "The story of the Diocese of Leeds is nothing other than the story of God's love for us in Christ – the story of persistent love, and the story of a love that lives and learns.

"The Diocese of Leeds – its people, parishes, the beautiful, complex, diverse, challenging communities it serves; this is the place where God is pleased to dwell, and out of this fair land, and built upon this rock, the people of God here, by the power of the Spirit, bear fruit."

The service ended with a commission from the Archbishop to all to carry on faithfully serving God in our region, before Bishop Nick and students from Lepton School cut the cake made to mark our anniversary.



Rambling Revd to walk some 160 miles to raise money

Some of the brightest and best at Bishop Young Academy in the heart of Seacroft, welcomed Archbishop Stephen and the Rt Revd Arun Arora, Bishop of Kirkstall, when he moved into our Leeds EA on the Friday afternoon.

Children, cake and fun featured at St Richard's, Seacroft – an estate church which engages lovingly with its people in a hard-pressed part of Leeds. An early start on Saturday at Lighthouse at St George's Crypt, Leeds gave Archbishop Stephen the chance to join its morning service for a Christian community "battered and bruised by the storms of life" in the words of founder Revd Jon Swales.

"That must be really difficult" - this is frequently the comment from friends and strangers when we talk about me being a hospital chaplain.
