Dear Friends,

You will have noticed that Easter Sunday is early this year! We are already in the season of Lent, which began on 14th February with Ash Wednesday. During Lent people often give something up or take on something extra.



If you are anything like me, over the years, each Lent you will have started with many ideas. I have often planned to give something up, to spend more time with God in prayer, to spend more time reading the Bible, and to read a book that helps me reflect on the season. In the end I pare my list down to what is physically possible!

We all start with great determination, but what if you have had a lapse in, or even given up on, your Lenten discipline? Perhaps you've eaten that slice of cake, or drunk that glass of wine, how does that make you feel? Do you feel disappointed, disillusioned, or even a failure?

If you do stray from the path of your Lenten discipline, get back on it, don't give up. Sharing your plans with someone else can be a good help, after all our Christian faith is one lived out in relationship and community rather than alone, so make use of your church family and encourage one another. As St Paul writes, "Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.'

I believe a good way to view our lapses is to see them as ways in which we learn to increase our dependence upon God. We are all only human, each of us needs to rely on God, and it is often at times of disappointment or failure that we feel closest to him. When we fail, we are forgiven.

We move towards Holy Week and Easter, and we walk alongside Jesus as he enters into Jerusalem to shouts of Hosanna, as he washes his disciples' feet, as he eats the Last Supper with his friends, as he goes to his death upon the cross, and as he is resurrected. The six weeks of Lent prepare us for Easter, and give us time to learn about the love God has for each one of us, and the love we should have for each other.

By following your Lenten path, however it pans out, you will see even more clearly the glory of the risen Jesus at Easter. Support each other, but most of all depend upon God. Whether you succeed or fail in your

> plans for Lent this year, I pray that when Easter arrives you have had a holy Lent, and have grown in faith and devotion

to our Lord Jesus Christ.

Why not come and celebrate with us at St Botolph at 10am on Easter Sunday?

Through the decades – 2010's

Our final and most recent decade. How much can you remember? The iPad was released in 2010 and the public launch of Instagram took place. There were two major earthquakes, one in Haiti and the other in Chile.

In 2011, Prince Charles' eldest son, Prince William, married Catherine Middleton. Their first son, Prince George was born in 2013 followed by a daughter in 2015, Princess Charlotte and a second son Prince Louis in 2018.




2012 marked the Diamond Jubilee of the accession to the throne of Queen Elizabeth II. The celebrations included the lighting of Beacons nationwide, a national service of thanksgiving and

the Thames Jubilee Pageant. The Summer Olympics took place in London, officially the Games of the XXX Olympiad.

Also, in this year, Tokyo Skytree opened to the public becoming the tallest tower in the world at 643m.

In 2013 there were a number of notable deaths including Margaret Thatcher and Nelson Mandela. Pope Benedict XVI resigned at the age of 85 years, leading to the appointment of Pope Francis



After travelling for nine years, NASA's Horizon spacecraft took photographs of Pluto in 2015. They showed ice mountains on this dwarf planet. In this same year NASA confirmed the presence of water on Mars sparking discussion as to whether there really could be life on Mars.

In 2016 around 52% of Britons voted to leave the European Union and so the battle of Brexit began.

2017 was the UK's greenest year ever for electricity production as renewable energy, wind, solar and nuclear created more UK power than fossil fuels. In July England's women lifted the Cricket World Cup, after a thrilling final against India.

In the February of 2018, the Beast from the East, freezing weather from Russia, brought heavy snow and low temperatures to the UK. Prince Harry married Meghan. Professor Stephen Hawking, whose life's work shaped modern cosmology and helped us all to better understand the universe, died at the age of 76years.

In December of 2019 a cluster of pneumonia of unknown origin was identified in Wuhan, China and thus began the worldwide

Covid-19 crisis. Climate change was one of the biggest topics of the year and teenage activist Greta Thunberg came to fame as one of its biggest champions. Notre Dame cathedral in Paris was devastated by a massive inferno.



In the 2010s there were four Prime Ministers of the UK: Gordon Brown,

David Cameron, Theresa May and Boris Johnson. In the USA the presidents were Barak O'Bama and Donald Trump.

We hope these articles have invoked some memories.




Jesus comes on a donkey to Jerusalem.

On Holy Thursday, Jesus washes the feet of his apostles and sat down to eat supper with them.






Jesus is alive








Later that day, the women saw Jesus and started worshipping him. Afterwards, they went to tell the apostles.

The Ascension




The apostles were in a room when Jesus came to them and showed his wounded hands to show it is really him.

The Archbishop of York's Missionary Journey to Wakefield

The Archbishop of York, Stephen Cottrell has been on a special visit to the Wakefield Episcopal Area.

Archbishop Stephen took part the monthly breakfast meeting for Wakefield's business and community leaders, which is hosted by the Rt Revd Tony Robinson, Bishop of Wakefield. Bishop Tony said: "Everyone was uplifted and encouraged by meeting with Archbishop Stephen. We spent a very varied day in Wakefield, meeting with people from across the district, including business and community leaders, those in our prisons, and with people exploring faith and discipleship." Archbishop Stephen and Bishop Tony were welcomed at HMP Wakefield where they preached and presided at a Eucharist

After lunch at the Yorkshire Sculpture Park, Archbishop Stephen and Bishop Tony visited HMP New Hall Prison and Young Offender Institution and helped





in supporting in group-led conversations.

Back at Wakefield Cathedral, the Archbishop finished the day by speaking on the topic of vocation at a Follow Me event, one of four sessions hosted by Bishop Tony for lay people in the Wakefield Area to encourage them in their discipleship. Archbishop Stephen said, "Having previously worked as the Diocesan Missioner and Bishop's Chaplain for Evangelism in what was then the Diocese of Wakefield, this part of the country holds many fond memories for me.

"It's been wonderful to be back to this place, to hear and see the hope that the present holds for this area. I've had the opportunity to meet with local people from across the social boundaries, each with their own story and experiences."

Our bishops to lead Rhythm of Life retreats this Lent

Our bishops will be leading retreats across the diocese this Lent as part of our Rhythm of Life initiative, helping us to pray, reflect and learn together in the season.

Five retreats are being led by our bishops and others including the Bishop of Bradford, the Rt Revd Toby Howarth; the Bishop of Ripon, the Rt Revd Anna Eltringham; the Bishop of Kirkstall, the Rt Revd Arun Arora; and the Rt Revd John Pritchard, former Bishop of Oxford.

The retreats will feature a mix of reflection, encouragement, challenge, prayer and worship.
The Revd Canon Andrew Norman, Director of Ministry and Mission for the diocese, said: "These Lent retreats are a great opportunity to pause and reflect on our rhythms of life."



That's Temptation

Bishop Tony

A little boy in a grocery store was standing near an open box of peanut butter cookies. "Now then, young man," said the grocer as he approached the young man. "What are you up to?" "Nothing," replied the boy: "Nothing." "Well, it looks to me like you were trying to take a cookie." "You're wrong, mister, I'm trying not to!"

That's temptation!
Jesus was tempted as we are. Temptations are not bad in themselves, but it is what we do with them that can help us turn to God or away from God.

At the beginning of Lent the Church always takes us into the wilderness with Jesus, to face the power that is opposed to the Gospel. The Good News is that we do this with Jesus and in the company of his followers.

None of us should have to face the wilderness alone; none of us should be thrown back on our own resources. We are all tempted; we all fail; we all sin.



Sometimes we might wonder if there is an exit from the wilderness. All of us need to hear, like Jesus, the voice of the Father that recognises us as his beloved children. When we hear that voice, the call to repent is the call to stay in the company of the one who loves us. The Gospel challenges us to change our minds about the way we think, change our hearts about the Gospel we ignore, and change our ways about habits of sin.

This is a lifetime's task. Jesus did not overcome Satan in the wilderness – he achieved that only in his death. Lent reminds us of our need to begin again facing the enemy within us. And the Good News is that when we do that, we take the road that leads us to the kingdom of God.

During Lent try to see your temptations as ways to turn to God rather than rely our own resources?

Sad news of the passing of the Rt Revd David Smith, former Bishop of Bradford

It is with great sadness that the death of the Rt Revd David Smith, former Bishop of Bradford, has been announced.

Born in Hertfordshire in 1935, he was ordained in 1959 and served the former Diocese of Bradford from 1992 until his retirement in 2002, when he was succeeded by Bishop David James. Prior to that role, he had served as Archdeacon of Lindisfarne, Bishop of Maidstone and Bishop to the Forces.

The Rt Revd Nick Baines, Bishop of Leeds said in tribute: "This is very sad news. Bishop David was loved and respected in Bradford and will be remembered across the faith communities for his faithfulness.

"May he rest in peace and rise in glory. We send our love and condolences to Mary."



Puppets help bring new families to worship in a Bradford church

Bubble Church, an exciting new Jesus-centred service packed with puppets and designed for babies, toddlers and young families has kicked off successfully at one of our Bradford churches.

At its launch, 19 local children and 15 adults joined nine of the Bubble Church Team for the first ever service.

"Those attending were evenly divided into half regular church members and half first timers," Revd Chris said.






