Friends of St Botolph's Parish Room

Duncan from Martin House joined us a few weeks ago and he gave us figures as to how much it costs to run the Children's Hospice and he also explained the care they give.

£9 million to run the Hospice a year.

£50 means a child can enjoy a music therapy.

£12 enables a young person to join a virtual support group.

£20 helps buy vital medical equipment.

£10 buys a baking session with ingredients.

£30 helps grieving parents to have a bereavement session with a counsellor.

£5 helps to man their 24-helpline so that anxious parents can get support. £15 supports a chid in a play session.

There are 15 bedrooms at Martin House, these is split between Martin House and the Whitby Lodge which offers more for the children and their families. The care unit at Boston Spa was opened in 1987, for babies children and young people. Every year Martin House offers care 24/7 365 days a year, supports 440 children and young people, over 160 families have bereavement support.

Their help is mainly from volunteers Donating, Doing Challenges, sending Gifts in Memory of a loved one, organising events, working their shops etc.

Our group has been busy knitting, we met up with the lady to sell our knitting for Martin House. The charity was very grateful. This was mainly baby knitting now we have been asked to knit dolls clothes as the lady said they will go well for Christmas. We will be meeting up again with the lady as she is wanting to price the knitting up, for their Christmas sale in the next week or two. Thank you ladies for the knitting and your help in the charity.

Last week went out to lunch with the group at the Fig and Olive in Womersley. It was lovely meal and surroundings, we will be going back again. Thank you, Sarah for looking after us so well and the lovely food.


church funds.

Through the decades The 1980s

In 1981 Prince Charles married Lady Diana Spencer. In the same year the first London Marathon was organised and the 100th FA Cup Final was played.

The Falklands (undeclared) War broke out on 2 April 1982. Argentina invaded the British Territory of the Falklands and then South Georgia. After ten weeks Britain recaptured the islands but there had been casualties and naval and air losses on both sides. In this year Prince William of Wales was born on 21 June.

Surgeons at Harefield Hospital successfully carried out the first full heart and lung transplant in 1983. The law that all drivers and front seat passengers must wear a seatbelt when driving in the UK was passed.

In 1984 major industrial action was taken in the mining industry. The miner's strike, led by Arthur Scargill, was an attempt to prevent colliery closures. Prince Henry of Wales was born on 15 September, a brother for Prince William.

Bob Geldof and Midge Ure organised the biggest rock concert ever seen in Britain at Wembley Stadium, Live Aid, to help Band Aid. This took place on 13 July 1985 and Philadelphia's JFK Stadium organised a similar event. Millions of pounds poured in from all over the world to help the starving people in Ethiopia.



Also in 1985, David Attenborough was knighted by Queen Elizabeth II. This was for his work on conservation of the natural world.

In 1986 explosions in the nuclear power plant in Chernobyl caused the worst ever nuclear disaster.

A powerful storm ravaged many parts of the UK in the middle of October 1987, with winds gusting up to 100 mph.


In 1988 archaeologists uncovered the original Globe Theatre in London. Stephen Hawking published A Brief History of Time in

the same year.

1989 saw the fall of the Berlin Wall that had, for nearly 30 years, been a barrier between East and West Berlin.

Throughout the decade, being elected on 4 May 1979, Margaret Thatcher was Prime Minister. She resigned on 28 November 1990. She was succeeded by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, John Major.

American Presidents during





52 years, The Beatles star, John Lennon, aged 40 years, the actresses Anna Neagle, aged 81 years and Margaret Lockwood, aged 73 years, the actors Laurence Olivier, aged 82 years and Orson Wells, aged 70 years. The former Prime Minister, Harold MacMillan died aged 92 years, the comedians Eric Morecambe aged 58 years and Tommy Cooper aged 63 years, the actress Diana Dors aged 52 years and footballer Dixie Dean aged 73 years.

The 1980s saw the rise of the 'yuppie' and an explosion of blockbuster movies like ET,

Rambo, Top Gun and numerous Indiana Jones epics. Television classics like Hi-de-Hi, Yes Minister, Juliet Bravo were enjoyed and Pudsey Bear made a Children in Need debut in 1985,

Here's to the next decade.

My Tour "Across" to Lourdes (1994) contd


Tuesday we should have gone to Biarritz for a day at the seaside (is that where Bridget Barot lives? Oh no that is St Tropez). Never mind, we were rained off and went to Gauavnie in the mountains, 1.5 miles above sea level. Beautiful town, good local driver an we watched a mountain rescue by helicopter while eating our picnic lunch. We went shopping, looked around a perfume factory (the prices were ridiculous - expensive) then up a steep hill, in agony, to a service. We eventually get inside this famous church and a group of Germans (bless 'em) came in demanding to know who we were. We told them we had booked the church in February for a special mass, she, the leader, said she had booked it yesterday, Leave! Some did (6' 4" and broad as the Titanic). Makes a change from nicking pool side beds though, doesn't it? So, our driver took us up to a statue on another mountain top called, "Lady of Snows". It was beautiful and the views were magnificent. The escaping prisoners of was who passed this way in the last war paid for this statue; erection of it as a thank you to God and the Holy Family, for their safe keeping. We had our service here where they should be, Sermon on the Mount, etc absolutely perfect. All content for the return views back to Chalet Across; wonderful day and stories.

Wednesday, all elbows at the quickest as we had to be off at the earliest for the International Mass in the big underground Basilica. Quite takes one's breath away, I personally have never seen a building like it. It was quite emotional during the service and the emotion is recurring as I write this, remembering the faith, love and devotion of all those there, those who had been before and those who had built such a magnificent room for the Glory of God, Mary, St Bernadette and the Holy Family. Yes, I say room! As it

was one compartment, dare I say the size of Wembley Stadium (never been there but seen it on TV) with 4 ramps down to the underground floor level with a central altar. Our priest took an actual part in the mass after the service, what an honour for our group. After lunch (picnic again but plentiful) we had the Blessing of the Sick. We got front line side



places for the wheelchairs and I, with 2 other pushers (personalities), was able to sit on the floor in front of them to watch the proceedings. An estimated ten and a half thousand wheelchairs were there that afternoon (capacity for the Basilica 25000), I have never seen so many chairs ever, plus their pushers and pullers and other general visitors. The service was International and I think 7 different languages were spoken; the music was superb as usual. Had a relaxing evening after dinner. It had been a long day and oh so worthwhile (just hope all the photos of the Basilica and everywhere else come out well).



Thursday was a day to forget. It rained all day so we gave the morning and afternoon up as a bad job.

Friday, we went into Lourdes for a mass in the English Pilgrim Church at the side of the main square. St Joseph's Church was a small, unadorned, perfectly though-out place for the disabled. The only place I can say that about. Other people came in to take communion but they stayed at the back of the auditorium as it was billed as a private mass of thanksgiving for ourselves. Then into Lourdes for a picnic lunch and shopping. The picnics we had (except) were in the wayside cafes. The owners were quite willing to do this all over Lourdes. We could eat our own food, from Across, as long as we bought drinks from them. Wonder if they do this in England, don't think so!

In the evening I wanted to see the Candle Lit procession that we had been in on Monday from the other viewpoint. So, the doctor and a VIP with me went above the first part of the Basilica to watch it. It was all lit up with candles weaving around, the back cloth was a rocky mass with a castle on top which was also lit up. It was lovely but not as rewarding as actually being in the procession but I was pleased to have seen it first hand from both sides so to speak. We had our official photo taken today, with the Basilica in the far background. (It turned out very well.)

Saturday was packing a cleaning up day. Yes, we had it all to do plus washing all the breakfast pots in the kitchen. Staff were preparing double meals but we managed it. We had mass at the Ukrainian Church, in the grounds known as the Dovecote. We went into Lourdes for a last look and

to get our Holy Water, had out evening dinner and set off home, the Jumbulances flashing their four blue lights, horns blaring all the way down the main road, the staff and new people waving at the garden wall. What emotion, what a send-off, what joy!!

Just a recap on the Wednesday. Before the Blessing of the Sick, we took the VIPs to bathe for Dipping and Submerging. I was asked if I wanted a go, so I said yes thought while I am here, I would like to do everything first hand and know what it is like form my own point of view. I was told the water was TEPID (wrong!)). One strips off to undies then in a private corner you drop these to be covered with a cloth of 'ice', you walk down some steps into a bath of running water, you are asked your nationality and religion. The water felt cold, was it me or what? Then you are asked to sit, by 'ek geebers, just like ice but wet. Then you are lowered quickly backwards, then up, by 'ek again!! and ecky thump goosepimples on goosepimples. But the Miracle of Lourdes was the fact that in 2 minutes you were dry, without a towel, no need for talc or anything before you put your clothes back on. Still would not have missed it.

We left 1915 on Saturday and arrived back in Wakefield at 1745 Sunday; it had been an excellent journey home. No regrets, no complaints and plenty of new friends.

My summing up and advice is as follows. A personality is worthwhile but be prepared to work; you have 9 days on call and no real rest. The VIPs come first always but you do feel rewarded. I wouldn't go again next week but may be next year, sort of thing. I was shattered but content to know that myself and others did our but well for the VIPs and others that we met. To the best of my knowledge, we were good ambassadors for England (or Great Britain if you like). The Across badge and buses do open doors and get respect. There were ramps into the underground Basilica, St Joseph's Church and the Across Chateau but in other areas it was quite difficult to negotiate the wheelchair; shops had steps, the footpaths were high, aisles in the shops were narrow and many churches had steps. This was rather surprising and disappointing as it is an area that many disables visit. I wrote to the Pope about it but I doubt if anything will come of it, but I have done my bit.

If you have the opportunity, have ago yourself; you'll love it.



Creationtide Conference to help churches care for and use their green spaces



How we can care for and use our churchyards and green spaces effectively is the topic of an upcoming one day conference hosted by the Diocese of Leeds and Ecclesiastical.

The conference will be on Wednesday, October 4, the feast day of St Francis of Assisi and the end of the Season of Creation.

This event, hosted at St Stephen's West Bowling in the Bradford area, coincides with the launch of a new churchyard toolkit.

The toolkit is designed for anyone who has responsibility for or uses their local churchyard and wishes to explore its potential as a haven of biodiversity; an educational/heritage resource and family friendly space; and as a space for quiet reflection and prayer.

Throughout the day there will be a programme of relevant speakers including Yorkshire Wildlife Trust, the Diocese of Leeds's own Children, Young People and Families team, and case studies to help you make the most of your churchyard, increase biodiversity and create a space for all to enjoy.

Giving generously

Bishop Arun

Later this month we will be embarking on Generosity Week as Stewardship teams across the Church of England remind us of the generosity of God and of our own call to be generous with the gifts He gives to us.

Giving is an intensely personal business. Like many vicars, I made it a point of principle when I served in parish ministry never to know who gave what financially to church.

Fundamentally, giving is part of discipleship and an individual's relationship with God. If people are going to short-change what they offer to God, they will be answerable to someone much more important than the vicar. The account in the book of Acts about Ananias and Sapphira withholding money is a cautionary tale.

I can't remember exactly when I discovered the official Church of England policy on financial giving but I do remember that I had been worshipping in the Church for a number of years and was more than a little surprised to discover what it said. Perhaps that was because we didn't really talk about money much in the parish where I worshipped.

The official policy of the Church of England on individual giving is that church members are encouraged to commit only 5 per cent of their net income to the Church and a further 5 per cent to other



charities. My Christian upbringing in the Baptist tradition provided a different approach rooted in the biblical concept of tithing; that you gave 10 per cent of your income to the Church. If you wanted to give more, either to the Church or to other charities, that was fine but 10 per cent to the Church was the baseline. I naturally thought this would apply in the Church of England too.

The Bible does talk about money a great deal and it is something that Jesus consistently addresses in his parables and teachings, as with the widow giving all that she has to live on to the temple treasury; the parable of Dives and Lazarus; the sadness of the rich young ruler; or the warning to give to the poor discreetly so your left hand does not know what your right hand is doing.

The Bible also talks about the wonderful generosity and abundance of God who gives to us our every breath. We are reminded of this each week in the words of the thanksgiving prayer 'all things come from you and from your own do we give you.'

As we give thanks for the generosity of God so we too recognise our call to give first to the Lord and for what we do with our resources to be an integral part of our discipleship individually and collectively.

Check up on your giving this coming Generosity Week

PCCs from churches across the Diocese are encouraged to carry out a Generous Church Check Up to mark Generosity Week, which runs from Sunday September 24 to Sunday, October 1.

The Generous Church Check Up is a simple task that will help PCC members to talk about and explore how to encourage giving and generosity in churches and the wider community.

The check up list helps churches work through a series of short questions and relaxed group activities enabling a review of giving practice, acknowledging the positive steps already taken to encourage giving in church and growing a generous culture, but will also help to identify new opportunities to grow further.

Senior Stewardship officer, Janet Edmond, said: "If your PCC hasn't carried out a review of giving this year why not start this Generosity Week and make it an annual event during every National Generosity Week?

"You should come away from your session with a vision of how God is calling you to be generous as a church and the steps you need to take to get there."

Harvesting anytime

Do you ever find the church calendar unhelpful? Or feel stuck in a church season? Ritual and rhythms help our spiritual journey. Anniversaries give opportunities for remembering. But sometimes, I feel a frustration, almost a play acting whilst we wait to celebrate Christmas or Easter morning. Advent is heavily weighted to expecting Christmas, rather than the second coming of Jesus, that the world is yet to experience. Let's celebrate! Remembering, reflecting but expectantly.

We are in the harvest season. A rewarding gathering of fruits of hedgerows, allotments, and fields.

What of spiritual harvest? Is this as seasonal as plums and marrows? Is it now? Is it even something we expect? Has the seed planting, watering, and nurturing gone well? The Holy Spirit is at work in places, in all seasons, we are not aware of. We might be seasonal as those that plant in tears will harvest with shouts of joy.

Part of my lay leader role has been seed sowing amongst worldwide tourists with the Intercontinental Church Society. I don't have a harvest overview, but it's God's worldwide team's mission.



I have been asked to encourage people, new to a town, to seek Jesus. With a longer and more static view, do I expect to see a harvest? Too right I do! This is not just a mission to create cosy feelings of a new place to live, but with expectation that the Holy Spirit will call people to repentance, celebrate his forgiveness, find that faith in Jesus is an anchor in an uncertain world, and become his hope filled followers.

'Isn't there a saying, 'It's still four months until harvest?' I tell you, open your eyes and look at the fields! they are ripe for harvest.' Spiritual harvest is available at any time. Our life and ministry may have its seasons, but not necessarily God's harvest. Where meek souls will receive him, still the dear Christ enters their lives, and they enter the kingdom of God.

Not so seasonal as plums, and marrows. No need to wait until Christmas.

The harvest is plentiful but few harvesters. We can change this by asking the Lord of the harvest to send workers into the areas to harvest. A bumper harvest.

Please pray.


Modern slavery subject of upcoming workshop


