



Harvest Thanksgiving



The Earth is the Lord's and all that is in it... 'He makes grass grow for the cattle, and plants for man to cultivate – bringing forth food from the earth: wine that gladdens the heart of man, oil to make his face shine, and bread that sustains his heart.' Psalm 104, 14-15

Harvest has surely been celebrated ever since human beings first planted seeds, cut the heads of grain and stored them to use through the times of scarcity. When the children of Israel entered the Promised Land and left their nomadic existence in the wilderness, they adapted the agricultural festivals being kept in the Promised Land and these have come down to us today: Lammas, the time of the First Fruits, corresponds to the Feast of Weeks when the first sheaf of the barley harvest was offered. Our Harvest Festival corresponds to the Feast of Tabernacles which is described as "the feast of ingathering, at the end of the year" (Exodus 23:16). This was the last and greatest feast of the Jewish year and it was sometimes simply referred to as 'the feast'.

So there is much precedent in the Old Testament for a festival thanking God for food and farming. People understood their dependence on a good harvest blessed by God.

The Gospels are full of allusion to agriculture and harvest and although early Christianity was arguably a faith of the cities people were clear about the provenance of the food that they ate. At the time of Christ, it is estimated that around 90% of a person's time would have been spent producing and preparing food. Global aid agencies and fair trade bodies remind us that food production

and matters of justice in agriculture are global issues. Eating food is one of the few things common to all human experience. What type of food we consume and how readily available it is to us may vary widely. But we all eat. In our society the meals on our table will have been brought there through the contribution of many different people working in a variety of environments. This food chain typically involves farmers or fishermen, processors, retailers and those who purchase and prepare the food to eat.

A harvest service is an opportunity to offer to God the contribution we make in bringing food to the table; to give thanks and pray for others in the chain upon whom we are dependent; and above all to praise God who starts off each chain by creating the sun's radiance and giving life to all living things.

Harvest is a wonderful opportunity to remind us of the growing focus in our society on environment, health and food with God. It is a wonderful opportunity to give thanks for all the wonderful gifts of creation and to reconnect with our place as stewards of that creation. It is also an opportunity to pray for and with the farming community, many of whom are struggling to make a living in today's global economic climate.

A Harvest Prayer

God of the heavens and earth we thank you for the richness of harvest time and for food. May the fruitfulness of this time make us thankful for your constant love and care for us. We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

Amen.



Through the decades The 1970s

The decade after the 'swinging 60s' was a period of unrest and upheaval but there was plenty to celebrate too.

In 1970, Paul McCartney announced his break with the Beatles. The 'Jumbo Jet' age began when the Boeing747 was introduced into commercial service making air travel faster, easier and more popular.

1971 saw the founding of Greenpeace soon to become the largest direct action environmental group. 15th February was marked as D Day (Decimal Day) in the UK as it was the day that British currency switched from the old pounds, shillings and pence system to the current decimal currency.

VAT was introduced in the UK on 1st April 1973.

In 1974, what is considered to be one of the greatest sporting events of the 20th century, 'The Rumble in the Jungle', boxing match took place when Mohammad Ali defeated George Foreman

for the undisputed heavyweight title.

Microsoft was founded by Bill Gates and Paul Allen in 1975. It became the world's leading developer of personal computer software and applications. This publication is produced courtesy of their software.

In 1977, on 7th June Queen Elizabeth II celebrated her Silver Jubilee. More than a million people lined the streets of London, and a chain of beacons was lit across the country. The very first Wimbledon Championship was played 9th – 19th July 1877, so in 1977 the

centenary of this Grand Slam lawn tennis championship, was celebrated. On August 16th, Elvis Presley, The King of Rock and Roll, died aged only 42 years.

July 25th 1978 saw the birth of Louise Brown, the first human to be conceived through in vitro (dubbed test tube by the press) fertilisation. IVF was pioneered by British doctors, Patrick Steptoe and Robert Edwards. Also, the third longest pontificate in history, Karol Jozef Wojtyla, was elected Pope John Paul II. He was Pope for 26 years.

The Iron Lady, Margaret Thatcher, became the first lady Prime Minister of Great Britain on 4th May 1979. Mother Teresa of Calcutta was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize. She devoted her life to working among the poorest of the poor in the slums of Calcutta.

The Irish champion thoroughbred steeplechaser, Red Rum, achieved an unmatched historic treble in the 70s. The horse won the Grand National in 1973, 1974



and 1977, he also came second in the two intervening years, 1975 and 1976. He was renowned for his jumping ability, having not fallen in 100 races.

In the 1970s British Prime Ministers were Edward Heath, Harold Wilson, James Callaghan and, of course, Margaret Thatcher. The American Presidents were Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter.

During the 1970s notable deaths included the Duke of Windsor, aged 77, Dame Margaret Rutherford, aged 80, Dame Agatha Christie, aged 85, Charlie Chaplin, aged 88, Bing Crosby, aged 74, Dame Gracie Fields, aged 81 and John Wayne, aged 72.

My Tour "Across" to Lourdes (1994)

I was asked in November 1993 if I would be interested in a Pilgrimage to Lourdes and so to take my step-son, David, with a group from Pinderfields Hospital and Huddersfield General. I thought it would be nice. I had heard the story and seen the film about St Bernadette, also I had always wanted to go on one of these pilgrimages, so I agreed. It would be in September 1994, for 9 days. Then I thought, "Where the 'ek is Lourdes?". I knew it was France somewhere, but other than that I had no idea. February 1994 came, as did letters, forms plus suggestions, costings, notes for Doctors for the VIPs (what they called the

disabled). We had a title as well. "personalities", that was those who were not doctors, maids, house mothers, nurses, catering staff. Posh, eh?! Everything was put in order, passports checked, E111 filled in and signed, payments made, packed and ready for the off. Still didn't know where it was except in the "Pyrenees", should that have told me? I was good at Geography at school, but these mountains had me beat.



We had an itinerary of times, dates, places (these eventually change as quick as a chameleon's skin in a thunderstorm) but it still did not say where. Friday, 9th September came, 6.30 am we departed from home to meet at the church in Durkar, Wakefield. We had mass before we left, loaded up into the Jumbulance (an ambulance with beds, reclining chairs, cabin like on an aeroplane for food preparation, toilet, a bedroom of sorts below for the spare/relief driver) and off we went.


We drove down to Dover for a 1700 hrs sailing and the sea in port was rough. Someone said 'like a millpond' (Why do good sailors always say that?). Well, a 60 foot swell, is what it was and I was seasick. We were across the Chanel in a couple of hours. After getting the VIPs to be by 10 pm we settled down for a night's drive through France, getting up at dawn to see to the VIPs while the kitchen ladies prepared breakfast. We ten enjoyed the rest of our journey arriving in our Chateau Across at 10.30 pm. Saturday, beyond Bordeaux on or near the Spanish Border (so that is where it is!) had lunch then free time to unpack and sort ourselves out, 1730 mass then dinner and a quick sortie into Lourdes and then bed early for a good night's kip. Just to tell my readers I am not a Catholic, we were, on both buses of mixed religions and getting on very well.

Sunday, up at 8 am. The photo call was cancelled. After lunch, we went into Lourdes for the "Blessing of the Sick", about 90° in the open air, sun pounding down. Make the most of it as we did not see it again for the rest of the week. There were thousands there, the service Brilliant and most of all, understandable and the singing Beautiful. The remainder of the day similar to Saturday afternoon and evening, as most of the week.

Monday shopping and a look around Lourdes on foot, a picnic lunch on the meadow opposite the "Grotto" then onto Hosanna House, another religious holiday home for all types, not just pilgrims. In the evening we were in the Torch Light procession around the Square of the Basilica; magnificent and very moving, the people, thousands all with candles. The Heavens opened but, what the 'ek, who cared? We'd been there, done it, liked it, bought the tape and the t-shirt.



We will also be completing the West Yorkshire South 50th Anniversary Challenge and taking part in Parliament Week in November.



St Bernadette of Lourdes

Bernadette Soubirous, also known as Bernadette of Lourdes, was the firstborn daughter of a miller from Lourdes, in Hautes-Pyrénées, in France, and is best known for experiencing apparitions of a "young lady" who asked for a chapel to be built at the nearby cave-grotto.

Born: 7 January 1844, Lourdes, France Died: 16 April 1879, Nevers, France

Canonized: 8 December 1933, Rome by Pope Pius XI

Feast: 18 February (France); 16 April (elsewhere)

Of course, Mary, Jesus' mother, is the greatest saint. She has appeared to many people over the centuries. Each place she has appeared she has been given a different title. Our Lady of Lourdes was the title she was given after she visited Bernadette Soubirous, a fourteen-year-old girl in 1858. Bernadette lived in a very poor house in Lourdes, France, with her family. (It used to be a jail!)

One day Bernadette was out with her sister and a friend to gather wood for the fire. Bernadette, who suffered from asthma and was often sick, did not cross over the stream to gather wood on the other side with her sister and friend. While they were gone, Bernadette heard a noise over near a cavelike area, and she went to investigate.
