

It became known as the 'Swinging Sixties'. The music and fashion industries flourished with Rock and Roll continuing to thrive and the sound of Motown emerging.

Major artists of the time included The Beatles, The Tremeloes, The Kinks, The Hollies, The Bee Gees, Diana Ross and the Supremes.

Along with popular solo performers Tom Jones, Cliff Richard, Dusty Springfield, Lulu and Sandie Shaw. Some unforgettable songs were released including Silence is Golden, A Whiter Shade of Pale, Day Dream Believer and Leader of the Pack.



Famous films released during the sixties include Mary Poppins. The Sound of Music, King of Kings and The Great Escape.

Mary Quant took the fashion industry by storm when she designed the mini skirt and models included Twiggy and Jean Shrimpton.



By 1960 television was becoming a central part of British lives and many bought their first TV set to watch the wedding of Princess Margaret to Antony Armstrong-Jones on 6 May 1960. This also gave access, for the first time, to much loved programmes like Coronation Street, Doctor Who and Top of the Pops.

There were sad times during this decade when John F Kennedy was assassinated in 1963 and Martin Luther King in 1968. Sir Winston Churchill, one of the greatest statesmen and prime minister, died in 1965 aged 90 years. Other deaths in the 1960s included Clark Gable, Marilyn Munroe and Judy Garland.

Births included Lady Diana Spencer (1st July 1961) who later became the first wife of King Charles III, then Prince of Wales.

In 1966 an avalanche from a colliery spoil tip in Aberfan engulfed cottages and a local primary school killing 144 people including 116 children. Also in 1966 England, led by Bobby Moore, won the

FIFA World Cup, beating Germany 4 -2. Four months before the tournament the trophy had been stolen while on exhibition in Westminster Central Hall. It was later found, wrapped in newspaper, by a dog named Pickles.

Left over from the late 50s, the youth culture continued with the Mods, in their smart suits, parkas and riding scooters being at odds with the Rockers sporting


black leather jackets and other motor bike attire. By the end of the decade, they gave way to the much more peaceful Hippie culture with the Flower Power and brightly coloured loose flowing clothes.

British Prime Ministers of the 60's were Harold Macmillan, Alec Douglas-Home and Harold Wilson. Presidents of the USA were Dwight Eisenhower, John F Kennedy, Lyndon B Johnson and Richard Nixon.

In 1969, Apollo 11 took Neil Armstrong, Edwin (Buzz) Aldrin and Michael Collins to the moon. They became the first men to walk on

the moon's surface. As he climbed down the ladder, Neil Armstrong proclaimed 'That's one small step for a man, one giant leap for mankind'.

Here's to the next decade. Best wishes Peter Greenwood

Thank you to all who brought the salads, sweets, bread cakes who cooked chicken legs, to all who helped in the kitchen and everyone who made it a successful day.




It was a hard day but well worth it. We made £185 for church funds but it wasn't about a fundraising event, it was about our congregation and community getting together.

St Matthew 21 September

St. Matthew, also called St. Matthew the Evangelist, St. Matthew the Apostle, or Levi, lived in the 1st century CE, in Palestine. He was one of one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus Christ and the traditional author of the first Synoptic Gospel (the Gospel According to Matthew).



According to Matthew 9:9 and Mark 2:14, Matthew was sitting by the customs house in Capernaum (ion the Sea of Galilee) when Jesus called him into his company. Assuming that the identification of Matthew with Levi is correct, Matthew (probably meaning "Yahweh's Gift") would appear to be the Christian name of Levi (called by Mark "Levi the son of Alphaeus"), who had been employed as a tax collector in the service of Herod Antipas, tetrarch of Galilee.

Because Levi's occupation was one that earned distrust and contempt everywhere, the scribes of the Pharisees criticized Jesus on seeing him eat with tax collectors and sinners, whereupon Jesus answered, "I came not to call the righteous, but sinners" (Mark 2:15–17). According to Luke 5:29, this dinner was given by Levi in his house after his call.

Other than naming Matthew in the list of Apostles, usually pairing him with St. Thomas, the New Testament offers little information about him. The Gospel according to Matthew was certainly written for a Jewish-Christian church in a strongly Jewish environment, but there is some doubt about whether it was actually written by Matthew.

Tradition notes his ministry in Judaea, after which he supposedly missioned to the East, suggesting Ethiopia and Persia. Legend differs as to the scene of his missions and as to whether he died a natural death or a martyr's. Matthew's relics were reputedly discovered in Salerno (Italy) in 1080. His symbol is an angel, and he is a patron saint of tax collectors and accountants.

Summer's here! I know that joyful shout may have been rare in recent wet weeks, but as I write... the sun is shining.


Many of us have rearranged our holiday plans or seen promised events marred or cancelled due to the "worst since records began" weather, and we are all aware of the new global uncertainties driven by increasing climate chaos.

Memory, perhaps rose-tinted and with a hint of Vivaldi, takes us back to an imagined time of predictable seasons, rather than today's turbulent weather patterns.

It is tempting to look back at our economic climate in a similar way: the period of zero interest rates as a time of financial security, a time of plenty. Of course, it wasn't that way for many people. For example, poverty and deprivation in our communities led to the need for foodbanks at the same time as the possibility of negative interest rates was being discussed.

And with hindsight, where was the good stewardship in that time of plenty that prudently filled metaphorical grain stores ahead of plague, pestilence or war?

We are in testing times. As Christians, this should not surprise us. For most of the church's history and for most of the world's Christians today, such as our sisters and brothers in our link dioceses of Sudan and Tanzania,



life has been and continues to be precarious.

As with the climate or the economy, so with our faith. It is tempting, faced with global and local insecurities, to hark back to a time when the church seemed more stable, or God's ways seemed more predictable. But the Bible, and our Sudanese friends, call us to put our hope in Jesus, who doesn't always take us out of the storm but is here with us in the middle of it. Our diocesan "Barnabas" initiative encourages us to live confidently, generously, and sustainably as churches in our turbulent times. As we learn to live this way, with Jesus, going with the grain of God's work in the world, we experience the joy of tapping into the energy of the Holy Spirit and sharing that hope with others.

Our two new bishops, the Rt Revd Smitha Prasadam and the Rt Revd Anna Eltringham will be active in our Huddersfield and Ripon areas from next month and we all look forward to welcoming them and the new gifts they bring.

So, let's have a little more singing in the rain...

Horbury parish to connect with children and families

One of our Wakefield parishes is able to connect more with children and families thanks to new funding.

The parish of St Peter and St Leonard, Horbury, with St John, Horbury Bridge recently secured funds for a further three years of their Children and Families Project.

As a result of hard work, the parish has seen congregations grow, and become significantly younger in demographic.

Diocese of Leeds secures £3.9 million for Barnabas: Encouraging Confidence



The Diocese of Leeds is delighted to have secured £3.9 million from the Church of England for Barnabas: Encouraging Confidence.

The Barnabas programme offers our churches resources and support at different levels, and is how we all work towards the diocesan vision of 'Confident Christians, Growing Churches, Transforming Communities'.

The funding for Barnabas was announced at Diocesan Synod on Saturday, July 15 by the Bishop of Leeds, the Rt Revd Nick Baines.

Bishop Nick commended Barnabas to Synod members, saying: "Our diocesan vision has not changed in the nearly ten years we have been the Diocese of Leeds.

"We want to grow confident Christians who consequently grow churches which help to transform our communities.

"This vision has been, and continues to be, at the very heart of the strategic direction of this Diocese.

"I am pleased to be able to tell Synod this morning that two weeks ago the Strategic Mission and Ministry Investment Board agreed to give the diocese £3.9 million to fully fund the first phase of the programme we are calling 'Barnabas: Encouraging Confidence'.

"Barnabas sets an overarching strategic framework around which the diocese can intentionally be supportive of the missional needs of parishes and can bring a focus on revitalisation, growth and sustainability.

"This funding provides the wider foundation for supporting parishes right across the diocese as we use it to develop a long-term investment partnership rather than a series of ad hoc projects."

In Acts 11, the Apostle Barnabas encourages the early church to celebrate the good already happening, to put resources in the right places, and to accompany one another in mission.

This story underpins our approach: drawing on the wisdom of the parishes, recognising everyone has something to give, and reflected in strong relationships across the diocese.



Cranmer Awards come to Yorkshire for first time

The Cranmer Awards are coming to Yorkshire, for the first time in the history of this prestigious competition.

The Yorkshire Heat of the Cranmer Awards, an annual competition for children between 11-18 years old, will take place at St Margaret's Church, Ilkley, on Saturday, October 14.

The Cranmer Awards is a national competition run by the Prayer Book Society to introduce young people to the 1662 Book of Common Prayer, described as the 'bedrock of the Anglican Church'.

Named after the great English Reformer Thomas Cranmer, the awards encourage young people to develop their public speaking skills by reading a passage of their choice from The Book of Common Prayer.

Fr Alex Crawford, Vicar of St Margaret's said: "We're really pleased to be able to bring the Cranmer Awards to Yorkshire.

"The beauty of the traditional language of worship has been deeply loved by countless worshippers over the centuries in this country, and we're glad to play our part in helping to inspire the next generation."





Rooted deeper in God

As I prepare to leave the Diocese to take on a new role as rector of St Giles West Bridgford, I look back with great thanksgiving for the last 17 years and for each of the different roles I've held and communities I've been a part of. Reflecting specifically on the last five years and my role as Diocesan director of interns I give thanks that the programme is now established and has seen over 64 interns and 16 mission apprentices take part. There have been Diocesan interns serving in each episcopal area through different streams such as the Mission Apprenticeship, the New Wine Discipleship year and the Ministry Experience Scheme.

It has been a genuine privilege to journey alongside those who are wanting to grow as disciples and seek more of what God is calling them to do with their lives; to watch young adults grow in confidence in who they are as a child of God and stepping out using the gifts and skills He has given them. The programme wouldn't work without a dedicated team of line managers, mentors and teachers all willing to give of



their time to invest in each intern.

I would often say when speaking to groups of students that people are willing to dedicate vast amounts of time to becoming a great musician, an athlete or a baker, but when it comes to growing as a disciple we often expect it to somehow happen without any intentional effort. Giving a year of their lives to grow their roots deeper in God, developing a rhythm of life that sustains them, having the chance to explore theological questions and learning more of the Bible, equips them for life long discipleship whatever area of work they go into next.

With each cohort of interns I have also been personally stretched, challenged and blessed and have grown in my own understanding of God's love. I look forward in the years ahead to bumping into many who are working in all walks of life, serving in their local church, and growing as disciples of Christ, building on the roots they put down during an internship in the Diocese of Leeds.

Diocesan representatives took part in proceedings which covered a huge range of topics.

Synod backed a regional trial to offer Church of England weddings free of statutory fees, following a debate brought by Blackburn Diocesan Synod.

Following a motion from the Diocese of Oxford, Synod called for renewed action from the Church and Government to tackle the impact and causes of climate change.

Members of Synod also heard about recent national safeguarding matters, and had an update on the progress of the Living in Love and Faith process.








Holy Cross Day 14 September

It is said that the Passion Flowers bloom on Holy Rood (Cross) Day.

The Passion Flower (Genus: Passiflora) is indigenous to the Americas. The symbolism was first perceived by the Mexican Augustinian friar, Emmanuel de Villegas, who reported it, with sketches, in Europe in 1610. The Passion Flower was known in Spanish as "La Flor de las Cinco Llagas" or the 'The Flower With The Five Wounds.' 'Passionis' refers to (Christ's) suffering.

The parts of the flower relate to the story of the crucifixion. They represent the crown of thorns, the three nails and the five wounds of Christ.
